
Wednesday, 5:30 p.m. THIS WEEK AT UC IRVINE



As an alternative media source, KUCI has much to offer Orange County. From public affairs shows where the latest issues that affect the community and students are aired, to the latest in musical trends. Alternative media allows for the exploration and experimentation needed to keep new ideas and art forms flow-

KUCI's public affairs programs offer the listener a chance to hear community leaders address topics of interest in various fields of expertise. As a non-commercial medium, KUCI is open to any group that might like to put on a public affairs show. KUCI constantly presents helpful messages for non-profit organizations as well as announcements that inform and lead to a better lifestyle.

Most commercial radio stations don't present a mixture or variety of musical styles. As an alternative media source, KUCI presents music from all different genre. Every day from noon until three, the best and newest jazz music is played. The next three hours are reserved for experimental and progressive rock followed on most days by reggae and then the best in new music. And many people spend their mornings listening to soft rock and classical until noon. This type of programming is only possible from an alternative media source.
